



THE HIGH LINE'S NEIGHBORS COUNCIL SELECTS THREE LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS FOR GRANTS TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY WELLBEING

Documented, Fulton Houses Tenants Association Food Distribution, and Infrinity Receive a Total of \$25,000 from the High Line's Neighbor to Neighbor Fund to Provide Resources to Community on Manhattan's West Side

New York, NY (February 13, 2026) — The High Line's Neighbors Council has selected three local community-based organizations to receive a total of \$25,000 in grants in support of vital wellbeing and support services making an impact on young people and adults in Chelsea. Documented, a New York City-based newsroom that connects immigrant communities with key information and resources, will receive \$11,000. The Fulton Houses Tenants Association-led food pantry and distribution will receive \$8,000. Infrinity, a neighborhood organization that provides youth and community programming, will receive \$6,000.

The High Line's Neighbors Council — a body of community members organized by Friends of the High Line to advise and collaborate with the nonprofit on its work to support and engage the neighborhoods surrounding the park — identified some of the most urgent concerns facing the community: addressing food insecurity, youth development opportunities, support for migrant communities, and strengthening community connection and health. The Neighbors Council chose to amplify and bolster the work that these locally rooted organizations are already doing to further their impact in addressing these concerns, recognizing the importance of existing comprehensive services. Through these organizations' work in educating residents of available resources, providing the conditions necessary for people of all ages to acquire greater security, and deepening connections with each other, they improve the overall physical, mental, and social health and vitality of individuals and of the community.

[Documented](#) is an independent, non-profit newsroom dedicated to reporting with and for immigrant communities in New York City. They provide original, responsive reporting and actionable resource guides in English, Spanish, Chinese and Haitian Creole. Documented represents a radically different community-driven approach to journalism and information that impacts the everyday experiences of immigrants.

The Fulton Houses Tenants Association, a long-standing community partner with Friends of the High Line, has organized a food distribution service for fellow Chelsea residents and beyond twice a week for the past several years, with support from Gotham Food

Pantry. As a nonprofit organization dedicated to collecting, storing, and distributing food to those in need, they provide critical food assistance to residents facing food insecurity.

[Infirinity](#), another long-standing community partner of Friends of the High Line, is a group of family members, friends, and neighbors who have either grown up, lived, or have had close connections to the Elliott-Chelsea NYCHA community, offering community-based programs, events, and initiatives to Chelsea neighbors and anyone else who is interested. Infirinity uses a justice-centered, therapeutic approach to activate local leadership, build intergenerational connection, and remove barriers to access across the neighborhood. Infirinity's programs include intergenerational community spaces, youth mentorship, adult sports, financial development, self-care healing spaces, and their signature single-block festival, Infirinity Fest—all created and led by current and former Chelsea NYCHA residents.

The Neighbor to Neighbor Fund, a participatory grantmaking initiative first launched in 2021, is an initiative of the High Line Neighbors Council. Each year, the Neighbors Council works to identify critical community issues that the High Line can support through the fund. Over the past five years, the High Line's Neighbor to Neighbor Fund has distributed over \$105,000 dollars to local organizations and schools to address urgent community concerns. Past recipients have included James Baldwin High School, New Victory Theater/New 42 Youth Corps, Holy Apostles Soup Kitchen, public school Quest to Learn, the parent-organized PS11 Aid Foundation, UnLocal, Xavier Mission, Cambio Labs, and VISIONS at Selis Manor.

The High Line Neighbors Council is a multi-generational advisory group, established by Friends of the High Line in 2014—and relaunched in 2021—composed of representatives from local residential buildings, neighborhood organizations, and businesses located along the High Line. It serves as a conduit for channeling feedback from the community to Friends of the High Line, and advises on matters such as programming, operations, maintenance, and future planning, that directly impact our shared neighborhood. Youth participating in the High Line Emerging Leaders Fellowship program work with the Neighbors Council, earning experience in community organizing and advocacy. The Neighbors Council provides an opportunity for the High Line to develop and maintain connections with community members, discuss ideas and insights that inform areas of focus, and collaborate on community-based initiatives.

ABOUT THE HIGH LINE

The High Line is a public park on the West Side of Manhattan operated, maintained, and funded by the nonprofit conservancy Friends of the High Line. Through our work with communities on and off the High Line, Friends of the High Line is devoted to reimagining public spaces to create connected, healthy neighborhoods and cities.

Built on a historic, elevated rail line, the High Line was always intended to be more than a park. You can walk through the gardens, view art, experience a performance, enjoy food or beverage, or connect with friends and neighbors—all while enjoying a unique perspective of New York City.

Nearly 100% of our annual operating budget comes through donations. The High Line is owned by the City of New York, and we operate the park under a license agreement with NYC Parks.
